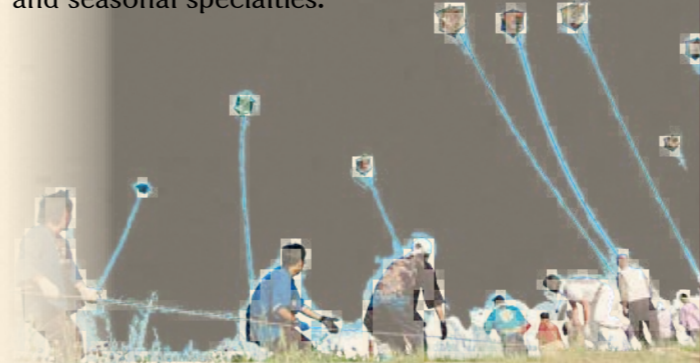

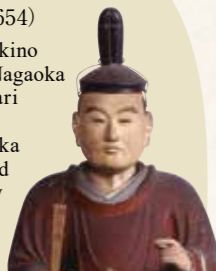
Explore the History of Nagaoka

Learn about our prominent leaders from the past, who built the foundations of Nagaoka and who contributed their efforts in areas of education and culture.

Tadanari Makino

(1581–1654)

The first lord of the Makino Clan appointed to the Nagaoka feudal domain, Tadanari Makino completed the construction of Nagaoka Castle and developed the civil government by establishing a legal system and developing agriculture.

Tsuginosuke Kawai

(1827–1868)

As a chief counselor of the Nagaoka feudal domain during the last days of the Tokugawa Shogunate, Tsuginosuke Kawai brought about political reforms. He commanded the Nagaoka troops during the Boshin Civil War. Advocating neutralism, he asked the New Government Forces for their understanding, which was refused and led to Nagaoka's resistance against them. He died during his escape to Aizu due to a bullet wound in his left knee.

Torasaburo Kobayashi

(1828–1877)

After its defeat during the Boshin Civil War, Torasaburo Kobayashi (Chief Councilor of the Nagaoka feudal domain) restored war-devastated Nagaoka. He insisted that a relief package of one hundred sacks of rice be sold to establish a school. He advocated the significance of education. This guiding principle known as the Spirit of One Hundred Sacks of Rice, which stresses education as the first priority, is the foundation of city development and shows Nagaoka's commitment to education.

Isoroku Yamamoto

(1884–1943)

Isoroku Yamamoto, the Commander-in-Chief of the Combined Fleet of the Japan Imperial Navy, commanded the Pearl Harbor attack. He stressed the importance of aviation and opposed starting the war between Japan and the U.S.A. because he understood the great difference in their national strength.

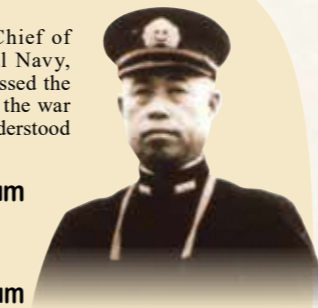

Kenshin Uesugi, a prominent samurai warrior, spent his youth at the castle situated on 227-meter high Mt. Kakujo, where he started his career as a samurai leader.

Kenshin Uesugi (1530–1578)

Known as the Tiger of Echigo, Kenshin Uesugi, a prominent samurai warrior in the Warring States Period, spent his youth (14 – 19 years old) in Tochio. He commanded fierce battles against Shingen Takeda, Ujijasu Hojo, and Nobunaga Oda. He is famous for his five battles at Kawanakajima against his lifelong enemy, Shingen Takeda.



Ryokan (1758–1831)

Ryokan, a Zen monk, is also known as a calligrapher and a poet. He was born in Izumozaki and became a monk at the age of 18. After a pilgrimage throughout Japan, he returned to his homeland of Echigo (present-day Niigata Prefecture) at the age of 39. As a humble Zen monk admired by many people, he spent the rest of his life in several parts of Echigo. Washima is known as his final destination.



This museum houses a number of poems composed by Ryokan and the nun Teishin, his disciple, as well as many other calligraphic and literary works by locals.

Kanetsugu Naoe (1560–1619)

Appointed lord of Yoita Castle, Kanetsugu Naoe, a great commander, stressed the significance of justice and love. He was known for wearing the character 愛 (ai/love) on the front of his helmet. Successor to the Naoe Clan, one of the big four under Kenshin Uesugi, he contributed to the development of local agriculture, industry, and commerce.

Nagaoka Fireworks

— The Nagaoka Festival Grand Fireworks Show —

Summer in Nagaoka is a summer of fireworks. Why do we launch fireworks annually on August 2nd and 3rd in Nagaoka? Nagaoka Fireworks are not simply brilliant and spectacular. Nagaoka Fireworks are displayed in order to send out our sincere and special messages to the world.

The People's Firm Determination to Restore the War Devastated City

The history of Nagaoka Fireworks is said to have started in 1879 when 350 fireworks shells were launched during the Hachiman Shrine Festival in Senju-machi. In 1926, Sho-Sanjakudama fireworks (3-foot-diameter shell fireworks) were first displayed, which made a name for Nagaoka Fireworks throughout Japan. However, the fireworks displays were discontinued due to the outbreak of the Pacific War.

On August 1st, 1945, American B29 bombers dropped a massive amount of incendiary shells over Nagaoka starting at 10:30 p.m. The bombing burned down most of the downtown area and claimed 1,486 lives.

After the Pacific War ended, the once-discontinued Nagaoka Fireworks Show was revived in 1947 during the Nagaoka Festival for Restoration from War Devastation, which was held to express our condolences to the Nagaoka Air Raid victims and to focus our thoughts on the restoration of the war devastated city. In 1951, this event was renamed the Nagaoka Festival with the revival of the Sho-Sanjakudama (3-foot-diameter shell fireworks).

The Nagaoka Festival has continued to be held on August 1st, 2nd, and 3rd every year since then. The fireworks displays on August 2nd and 3rd have gone on since 1948, in memory of the Nagaoka Air Raid victims, in appreciation of our predecessors for their efforts in postwar restoration, and with our prayers for the pursuit of everlasting peace.

Sho-Sanjakudama Fireworks (3-foot-diameter shell fireworks)

When a giant 3-foot-diameter Sho-Sanjakudama (300 kilograms) is launched up to an altitude of 600 meters above the ground, a huge 650-meter-diameter flower opens.



The diameter (approximately 650 meters) is more than the height of 634-meter Tokyo Sky Tree.

Niagara Falls

In the image of the true Niagara Falls, this 650-meter-long dynamic fireworks display, which is set up on Chosei Bridge and Ote Ohashi Bridge, vigorously flows down into the river, creating a mystical glowing world.

A Bridge of Peace Connecting Nagaoka and Pearl Harbor

On August 14th (15th in Nagaoka), 2015, the Memorial Service for 70th Year since the End of the Pacific War was held at Pearl Harbor. The sister cities of Nagaoka and Honolulu co-hosted and displayed Nagaoka Fireworks at Pearl Harbor with support provided by the U.S. Navy. In honor of American and Japanese war victims and with prayers for everlasting peace in the world, three shots of fireworks were presented to the sky over the site where the Pacific War broke out.

On August 15th (16th in Nagaoka), 2015, the Peace-Friendship Commemoration Ceremony was also held at Pearl Harbor, where Nagaoka Fireworks were also launched in expression of our condolences to war victims, for the pursuit of peace, and with wishes for the healthy growth of our youth.

These historic events allowed us to pass our messages of peace to our sister city, Honolulu, which also experienced the misery of war, in the hopes that our stronger messages will be further conveyed to the world and to the future.



Featuring the Highlights of Nagaoka Fireworks



Ten Chi Jin Fireworks

Commemorating the broadcast of Ten Chi Jin, a long-running period TV drama, Ten Chi Jin fireworks have continued since 2008, filling the summer night sky with a sparkling glow. The highly artistic fireworks in a magnificent scale (shot from nine locations along the Shinano River) depict the life of Kanetsugu Naoe, a samurai warrior who had a special connection to old Nagaoka.



Kome Hyappyo Fireworks (One Hundred Sacks of Rice) 100 Shots of Fireworks Shells in Sequence

A magnificent spectacle to behold, 100 shots of 8-inch-diameter fireworks shells go up in sequence in a "wide screen" method, passing the torch of the spirit of One Hundred Sacks of Rice to the children for their future.

Messages with Lights

At the end of the show, all the spectators join the finale by waving light-emitting devices in appreciation of the great efforts of the pyrotechnicians and the great support of the sponsors of the show.

What makes the Nagaoka Fireworks Show different from others?

The vast fireworks launching site along the Shinano, the longest river in Japan, allows pyrotechnicians to present wide-scaled fireworks shows by launching an abundance of 8-inch-diameter fireworks shells in sequence, creating an incredible number of 300-meter-diameter flowers in the sky.

Overwhelmed by the extravagant sounds of fireworks, spectators truly feel a marvelous sensation of the huge blossoms opening overhead.

The combination of the great location of the launch sites and the highly sophisticated techniques of Nagaoka's pyrotechnicians makes Nagaoka Fireworks quite unique and special.



Phoenix Fireworks Wishing for a Complete Recovery

Over a stretch of about 2 kilometers, these Phoenix-shaped fireworks, supported by funds donated by citizens and others, have flown high above the ground since 2005, one year after the Great Chuetsu Earthquake hit our city on October 23rd, 2004. Phoenix fireworks, all shining in gold, are launched to express our appreciation for the kind support provided by many people when we faced hardships, to encourage people in other disaster-affected areas, and to wish for everlasting peace in the world.



"Kono Sora no Hana" Fireworks

In commemoration of a film entitled "Kono Sora no Hana (The Flower of This Sky), the Story of the Nagaoka Fireworks," many colorful flowers bloom along with the theme music of the film. They paint the sky in various colors with the citizens' wishes for the pursuit of peace.



Fireworks with Our Condolences

The Nagaoka Air Raid started at 10:30 p.m. on August 1st, 1945. At this memorial time every year, during the Nagaoka Peace Festival on August 1st, three shots of fireworks are presented quietly in expression of our condolences to war victims. Bells in the city's temples also ring out extensively through the city.

A tradition of craftsmanship and special smithing methods forged since the warring states period

Based on the craftsmanship of swordsmithing in the warring states period, high quality carpentry tools have been produced and supplied from Yoita across Japan since the Edo period. In 1986, the national government designated the Yoita area as a traditional craftwork producer. The hammered iron tools created with Yoita's special smithing methods have a superb cutting quality.

Saw-manufacturing technology in Wakino-machi originated with Shobei Ogawa (later renamed Nakaya,) who acquired his expertise through an apprenticeship in Aizu-Wakamatsu under Juzaemon Nakaya. It was through his work that locally-produced saws became well-known throughout Japan. The many kinds of saws manufactured in Wakino-machi can meet any customer's needs.

Japanese Sake

A line-up of a variety of sake produced with pure water, excellent sake rice, and special sake-brewing techniques!!

Local sake breweries are blessed with pure water from the Shinano River full of snow-melt water from the nearby mountains, sake rice exclusively cultivated in fertile lands, and the traditional techniques of the master sake brewers. With these three essential elements of sake brewing, local brewers have produced various kinds of excellent sake. Snow is an essential element necessary for the kanzukuri method of sake-brewing in cold months.



A city ordinance encourages the people of Nagaoka to toast with sake.

The City of Nagaoka has 16 sake breweries, the largest number of all municipalities in Niigata Prefecture, which is known as a sake-brewing region. The city established an ordinance to encourage the people of Nagaoka to drink sake for toasts. This ordinance is the first of its kind in Niigata Prefecture. This idea was brought up in the hopes that koji-based food culture, such as sake brewing, will be handed down from generation to generation. Just taste-test the local brands and find your favorite! Sake also makes for a wonderful local souvenir.

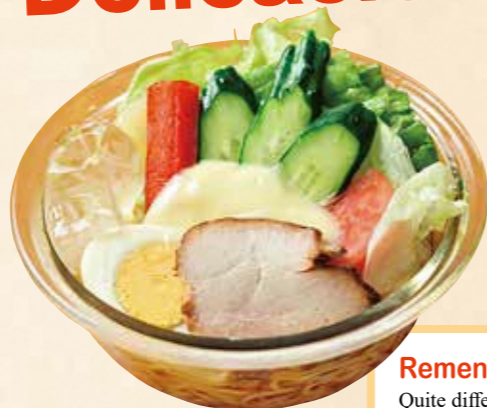
Local gourmet dishes are such a part of Nagaokans' daily diet that many of us don't usually realize that these dishes are only available in Nagaoka. Visitors from other areas often tell us how unique these dishes are. Enjoy these local delicacies when you visit Nagaoka.

Nagaoka Shoga Joyu Ramen (Ginger and Soy Sauce Ramen)

The aroma of ginger in soy sauce soup fills your mouth, easily warming you up on cold days. For many years, this ramen has been deeply rooted in Nagaoka, which is known as a highly competitive area for ramen in Japan.



Remen

Quite different from ordinary cold noodles or Chinese style cold noodles, Nagaoka remen is truly local soul food. The chemistry between the sour soup, sweet mayonnaise, and crisp vegetables is perfect.

Tochio's Cold Ramen

This chilled ramen with less fat is refreshing on a typically hot and humid summer day in Tochio, which is also known for its heavy snowfall in winter. This cold and tasty ramen is the result of local ideas.



Yofu Katsudon

(Western-Style Pork Cutlet Dish with Rice)

Slices of pork cutlet lie on a bed of rice and are drenched with a western-style sauce. There is the "Western-Cuisine" type with a ketchup-based sauce and the "Restaurant" type with a demi-glace sauce, both lovingly called "yokatsu (western-style cutlet)" among the locals.



Osen Ramen

In the image of Lady Osen, the dedicated wife of Lord Kanetsugu Naoe of old Yoita in the Warring States Period, this soy-milk-based ramen originated in the Yoita District in 2015. The harmony of the mild white broth seasoned with salt and the locally-grown vegetables create an exquisite taste.



Italian

Yakisoba (a stir-fried noodle dish) topped with meat sauce is a popular fast-food dish in Niigata Prefecture. It is often presented on TV as a typical Niigata B-grade cuisine. When people here say "Italian," it means this kind of stir-fried noodles, which should always come with gyoza (pot stickers).



Shoyu Sekihan

Nagaoka's unique sekihan is made from glutinous rice steamed with kidney beans and flavored with soy sauce. The delicate balance of soy sauce, steamed rice, and mildly sweet kidney beans make Nagaoka's sekihan, a regional specialty, incredibly delicious. Shoyu sekihan is available at any supermarket in town throughout the year.



Hegi Soba, Buckwheat-Funori Noodles

A special feature of soba-making in Nagaoka is the use of funori (a kind of seaweed) as a thickener, which makes these soba noodles smooth, firm, nutritious, and delicious. Soba noodles are served on a special tray called hegi. The accompanying tempura, deep-fried vegetables and seafood, are also dipped in the soy-based sauce for the buckwheat noodles. This is the local way to enjoy tempura.

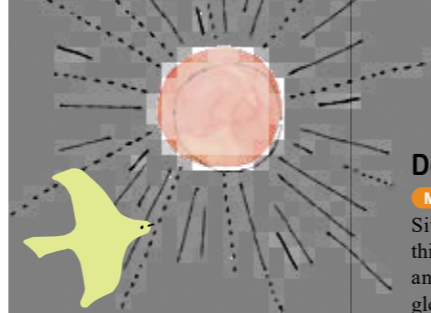
Banya Jiru Soup

Where did our ancestors come from? Civilizations usually form and flourish in areas where water exists. This is basic knowledge throughout the world. With the Shinano River flowing through it, Nagaoka is also a land with numerous historic sites and ancient objects being discovered.

The Flame-Shaped Pot and the Umataka Historic Site

The Flame-Shaped Pot (exclusively named), whose projections resemble tongues of flames, was first unearthed at the Umataka Historic Site in 1936. Together with this ancient pot, 300 other pieces of ancient earthenware and stone tools have been designated as important cultural properties.

Nagaoka's approximately 5,000-year-old flame-style pots, which were unearthed at the Iwanohara Historic Site of Fukasawa-machi, are on display at the British Museum in the U.K. starting from October 2016. In 2012, Nagaoka's ancient pottery pieces were in a special display at the museum. On the occasion of a renewal project of the Jomon Period Section of the Japanese Gallery at the British Museum, the museum requested that the City of Nagaoka display some pieces of its ancient pottery. The highly artistic flame-style pottery fascinates all who see it.





Terraced Rice Paddies and Carp Ponds

Yamakoshi

The step-like terraced rice paddies and ponds dotting the hillsides of mountainous Yamakoshi are our historic heritage. They present to us special seasonal features and remind us of nostalgic rural landscapes from the good old days. Raising *Nishikigoi* by utilizing terraced ponds is the symbolic industry of this area. "The System of the *Nishikigoi* Breeding Industry and Rice Farming Utilizing the Bounty of Snow" was one of the first items listed as Japan's Important Agricultural Heritage Systems.

Bullfighting (Yamakoshi District)

Cattle are essential for farming in mountainous areas. The approximately 1,000-year-old tradition of bullfighting is considered to be a sacred event in Yamakoshi. The specific feature of this tradition is to pull the two bulls apart at the climax of fighting without deciding victory or defeat. The locals' strong determination helped revive and preserve this tradition of bullfighting that was once discontinued. The bullfighting in this community is designated as an important national treasure of intangible folk culture.

Even though the soil in the Nakanoshima Okuchi area was inappropriate for rice cultivation, it was found to be good for growing lotus roots. Since that discovery, for over 90 years, Okuchi lotus roots with their crisp texture have been a well-known brand in Japan. The vast field with large green leaves in spring and with pristine lotus flowers in summer is truly a wonderful sight.

Todo no Mori Yusui (Spring Water) (Tochio District)

Supplying drinking and irrigation water, this spring has been a source of life for the community since the old days. Thanks to the locals' worship of the nearby mountain and a mythological god with the upper body of a horse and the lower body of a human, the spring continues to provide fresh and clear water in the sacred forest. The spring water is recognized by the Environmental Agency as one of the top 100 spring water locations in Japan, and is also recognized as one of Niigata's "Excellent Waters." The forest's soft spring water attracts many visitors who enjoy drinking it and even taking containers of it home.

Early March - Early April

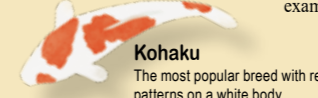
A kind of primrose known as yukiwariso in Japanese literally means a plant that grows by breaking through the snow cover. People from snowy regions especially admire yukiwariso because it is a plant that announces the arrival of spring. You can enjoy many colonies of yukiwariso in various shapes and colors throughout Niigata Prefecture. In Nagaoka, the Echigo Hillside Park (refer to p.18), the Snowy Region Botanical Gardens, and the Washima District are the places where you can enjoy yukiwariso.

Mini Illustrated Guide to Nagaoka Nishikigoi (Multi-Colored Ornamental Carp)

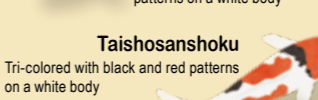

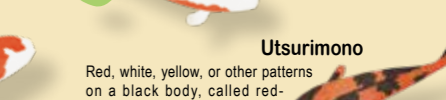
Kohaku

 Tri-colored with black and red patterns on a white body



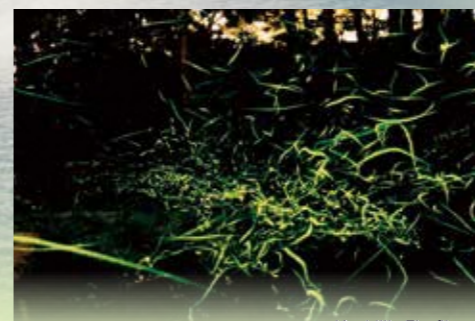
Utsurimono

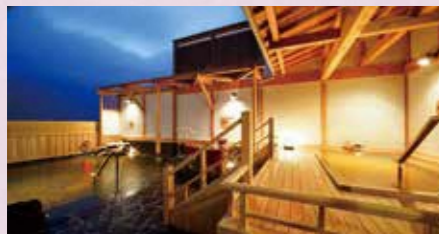

Blessed with quality water, the Settaya area has been known as a neighborhood of breweries over the years. Many time-honored sake and shoyu (soy sauce) breweries and miso (soybean paste) factories are concentrated within a 500-square-meter area. Visitors can smell the sweet fragrance of koji malt all around the town. The Settaya area has several registered tangible cultural assets of Japan including old storehouses and other buildings as well as many little shrines including Inari shrines. 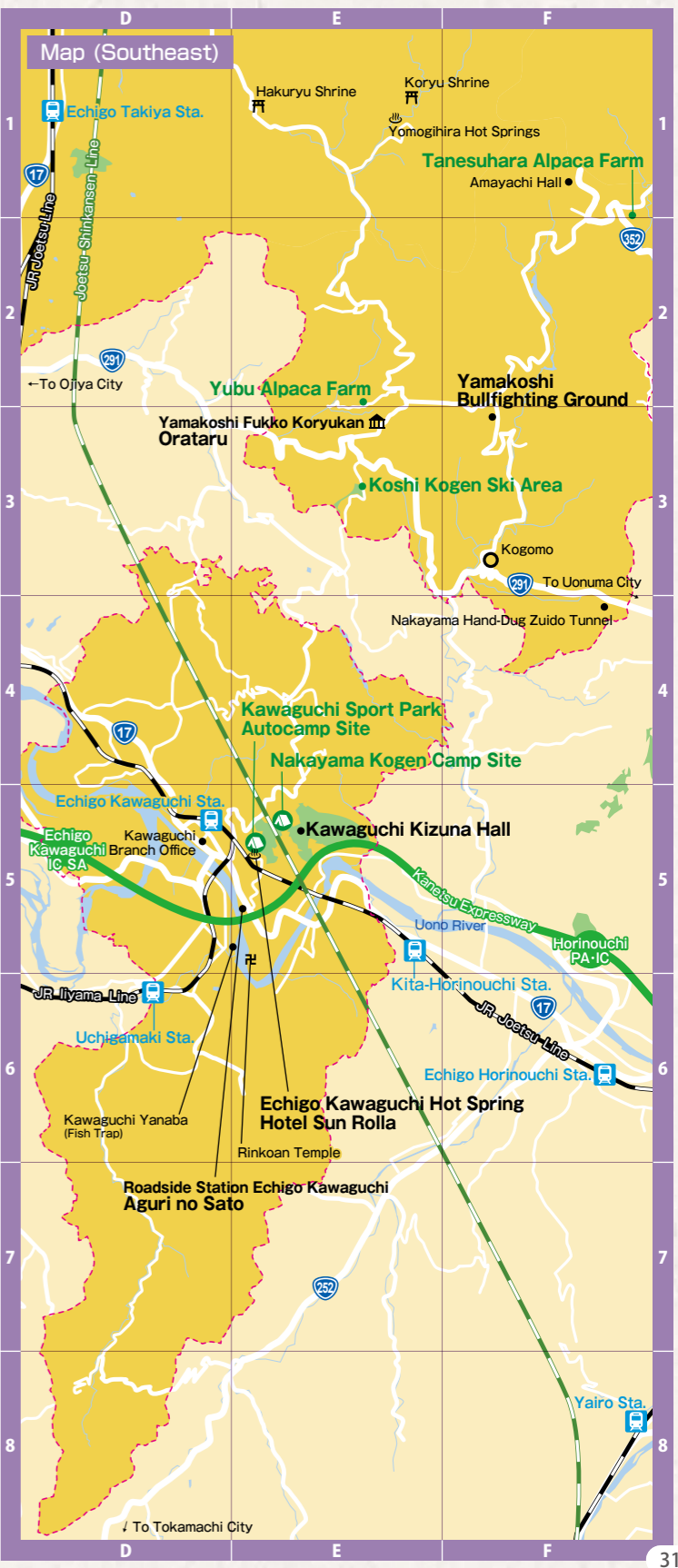

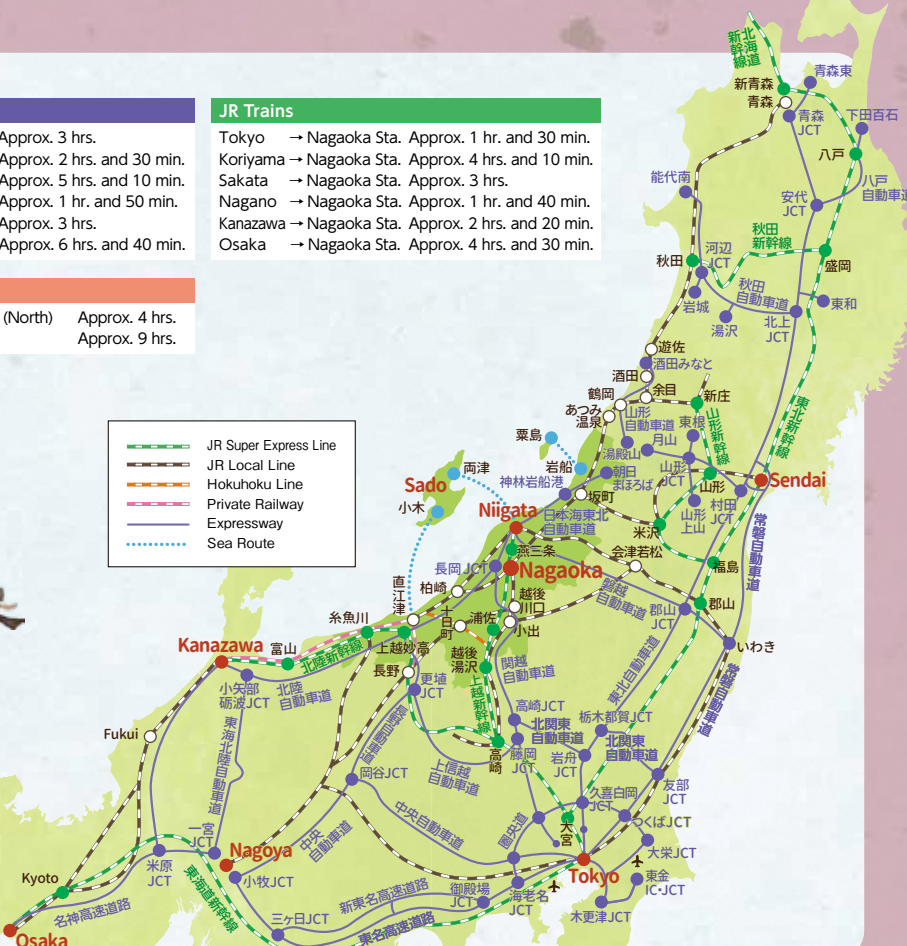
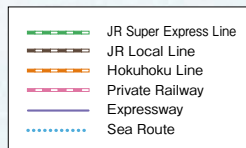
